
RECYCLE JPMS™ PACKAGING

Care & Styling Products

Next time you have an empty shampoo, conditioner or styling product, pause before putting the packaging in the trash. It only takes a few simple steps to recycle the packaging instead.*

If you have an aluminum or metal bottle with a plastic lid (i.e., a hairspray can), place the lid in the trash and recycle the bottle.**

If your plastic bottle has a plastic lid with an attached component that cannot be recycled (i.e., a spring), remove the component and place it in the trash before recycling the bottle and lid.**

USE AND SHARE THESE TIPS FOR BETTER RECYCLING

- Make sure recyclables are empty, clean and dry before putting them in the recycling bin.
- Toss the small stuff. Avoid putting anything smaller than a credit card in your recycling bin. Small items cannot be sorted and run the risk of jamming recycling equipment.
- Check your city's requirements before recycling any plastic.

 Some items—including plastic grocery bags, straws and utensils—shouldn't be thrown in your curbside bin.
- Think twice before putting it in the recycling bin. If you're unsure whether the material is recyclable, err on the side of caution.

 Contaminating your bin with non-recyclable items may result in the whole load being sent to the landfill.
- **Do a bit of research** before disposing of items like batteries, electronics, chemicals, paint, etc. Though they shouldn't be placed in your curbside bin, you'll likely find local drop-off centers that can properly recycle these items.
